Day 2 we revert right back to our old habits of performance. If I just stop and think for a little while, I realize this happens to me all the time. My actions reflect that I don't really believe Christ's work on the cross is enough to consider me righteous and redeemed. The scary thing is when I do this, essentially what I'm saying is, "Jesus, You didn't do enough. I need to do more to be saved." When you really think about this, isn't it a crazy proposition?! Do I really think my works are better than Jesus'? It's like telling Michelangelo he didn't paint the Sistine Chapel good enough so let me add to it. It really is ludicrous. If you relate to this at all, stop performing and accept the grace of Jesus' work.

Hard to Breathe


